


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Coming Soon – 2010 Census

What: Head Count

The census is a count of everyone residing in the United States.

Who: Everybody

All residents of the United States must be counted. This includes people of all ages, races, ethnic groups, citizens and non-citizens.

When: Every 10 years

The next census occurs in 2010. Census questionnaires will be mailed or delivered to every household in the United States in March 2010. The questions ask you to provide information that is accurate for your household as of April 1, 2010.

The Census Bureau must count everyone and submit state population totals to the U.S. President by December 31, 2010.

The first Census was conducted in 1790 and has been carried out every 10 years since then.

Where: Everywhere in the U.S.

The census counts everyone residing in the United States: in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Island Areas.

People should be counted where they live and sleep most of the year.

Why: U.S. Constitution

The Constitution (Article I, Section 2) mandates

a headcount of everyone residing in the United States. The population totals determine the size of each state's Congressional representation. The numbers also affect funding in your community and help inform decision makers about how your community is changing.

How: Via Questionnaire

The Census Bureau will mail or deliver questionnaires to your house in March 2010. We will mail a second form to households that do not respond to the initial questionnaire.

Households that still do not respond will be called or visited by a Census worker. (Census workers can be identified by a census badge and bag.)

Airport Noise

I attended the Concordia neighborhood meeting last night at Kennedy School regarding the airport traffic and noise in this neighborhood. I recently moved here from quiet little Eugene. I've lived in Portland before; in fact I grew up here on the SW side of town. Portland has grown since then, it's true. More traffic. More people. More crime. And yes, more noise. I've lived in Los Angeles, Denver and Minneapolis/St. Paul as well as small towns in the West, so I'm not coming from a quiet little town mentality. I never had to deal with this kind of noise pollution in any of those cities.

When I decided to move up here a few months ago, I had no idea that the airport noise would be so constantly annoying. I had been staying in the neighborhood off and on all summer. It wasn't until I was actually here for a week or two that the noise pollution really started getting to me. I'm a writer and musician and quiet and concentration time at home is important to me. So is my peace of mind.

Concordia is a beautiful neighborhood. A nice mixture of trees, people, gardens, shops, etc. No it isn't the richest neighborhood in Portland and perhaps that might be a factor in the airport's reticence to find other alternative routes for all the cargo plane traffic. That is the impression I get. We were given more information and a dandy little refrigerator magnet with a phone number on it to call when we are annoyed. Great! Am I supposed to be on the phone all day and into the night? That's about how constant the air traffic is over my house. What good does it do me after I've already been awakened from my sleep or distracted for the thirteenth time from my writing, or had to halt my conversation in my backyard just so I can be heard, to call? Is anything going to change?

I've tried to be patient this summer, assuming that it was going to be over come October. Little did I know that "over" meant only for this summer. That if I live here I'm going to have to endure at least two more summers of this assault on my senses. Good grief. Isn't anyone else as upset as I am about this?

I realize airports need maintenance. I know airports have to expand to meet the growing need of the cities they serve. But, with the river and all the industrial area surrounding Concordia as well as other available airports, I truly don't understand why other alternatives cannot be found. I feel if some of the Port Authority/airport executives lived and tried to work in my house they certainly would try a little harder to find a better solution. Right now I feel that it's a "not my problem, just live with it" attitude.

Land Use and Livability Update

Our October land use meeting was held on Tuesday, October 1. The majority of our meeting was spent discussing the Land Use Bureau of Appeals (LUBA) appeal which was filed by the Concordia Neighborhood Association (CNA) in September.

Some background on this appeal: A house was built on 32nd Ave, and the roof height is considered to be measured at 2 feet above current building code. Inspections by the city passed, and the final project was completed. Complaints were made to the Bureau of Development Service (BDS) and the city Ombudsman by a concerned neighbor. CNA's help was requested to file the appeal, and after an emergency meeting of the board, it was approved to proceed with the filing in September.

Our concerns are not with the design, or placement of the house, but that the building code was not followed. The hope for the outcome is that the developer/builder has to file for an adjustment, which will be on file with the city, and in the future this project cannot be used to bypass residential building height requirements anywhere in the city. Because this issue has an impact citywide, we are also asking other neighborhood associations to join in support of our appeal.


Tree Team update:

Three members (Barbara Wharton, Kristin Kaye, and Dove Hotz) completed the Tree Stewardship program of Portland Parks & Recreation, and will graduate on Saturday October 24th. There are funds available for grants, and currently they are working on a grant to plant more trees at Meek school. New members are needed; if you're interested please contact Bob Pallesen.

On October 11 there was a tour of the Ainsworth Arboretum. Concerns were expressed about the viability of the trees (especially the new ones), and responsibility for maintenance.

Other concerns:

Kennedy School/NE Jessup St – A group of neighbors have been meeting through the summer and are currently working to remove the on-street parking from the north side of Jessup Street from 33rd Avenue to the Kennedy School parking entrance. Concerns have been expressed about traffic congestion and safety along this street, especially when Kennedy School is busy. In discussions with the Department of Transportation, they found Jessup Street is narrower than typical residential streets. To proceed, Kennedy School management has been asked to sign off on the closure. We are waiting on their response.

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Fall Traffic and Parking Problems at Concordia University

Construction on Concordia University's new library and dorm apartments has just been finished and it's time to assess what the impact will be on nearby residences. This was the subject of a recent meeting of the Traffic-Parking Committee composed of longtime neighbors and several college representatives who did find much unfinished business. October is the deadline for the college to spell out in detail its improvements over the year in a report due to the City. Major problem areas exist.


The college had promised neighbors that on-street parking would be made more tolerable this summer by painting yellow parking stripes 3 feet on either side of driveways, but the college never followed through. The committee insisted that letters go out within one week to affected residents who have difficulty getting in and out of their front driveways and the work be done soon and quickly. CU will pick up the cost.

College security in the meantime will monitor cars parked too closely, in front of driveways, within 10 feet of fire hydrants, and into crosswalks and report them to Portland's city parking enforcement (823-5195). In a separate flier, residents were also encouraged to call the patrol and report infractions, but the key to improvement will be continual enforcement by the City and CU.

Certain areas of NE 27th, 28th, 29th, and 30th avenues between Holman and Ainsworth streets and NE 30th between Holman and Rosa Parks have traditionally restricted college parking. This restriction has been in place for some time per an agreement between CU and CNA, but the legality had been challenged by City lawyers. A final decision this fall has once again disallowed college parking on those streets. Neighbors can call CU Security who will enforce that rule (503-280-8517).

Since CU security is one person per shift, neighborhood awareness and reporting are the keys to easing some of the parking frustration. The college is also notifying both violators and their student body of the rules for parking. (Note: In Portland parking spaces in front of homes are not reserved for the residents.)

The second major parking-related aspect is to get more on-campus parking.



In getting its building permits approved, the college promised the City and the neighborhood that there would be 215 new on-campus slots by this fall. They have fallen quite short on that, due to City/County jurisdictional disputes. The new dorms have added 42 spaces and the college tennis courts will continue to park 44 vehicles. That still leaves a deficit of about 175

The head-in spaces were to be built along the vacated Liberty Street and NE 29th Avenue. CU plans to build those lots now since receiving the official go-ahead in late September. Neighbors have asked for interim measures. Fences are being moved back on both Liberty and Junior streets to provide parking. They asked that the spaces behind the president's house and the soon-to-be deconstructed empty nursing classrooms and the Good Shepherd Home become graveled parking lots.

Some positive changes have eased the parking situation. The construction parking is gone. Class hours are more spread out during the day with the new class spaces in the library, so parking will not be as intense during certain hours. Alternative methods of getting to the college are being pursued, and CU is looking at transit subsidies for bus use. But real change won't happen until the Liberty Street parking is in place.

The committee also wants to explore the idea of one-side-of-the-street parking, something that the Department of Transportation nixed a few years ago. Holman, NE 27th, and Rosa Parks at 29th are the streets where traffic gets bottled up.



the Vanport Flood, and to the present day and the individuals who worked to revitalize this neighborhood. Part of this task should include archives from the Oregon Historical Society, but may extend to longtime community residents. At a minimum, we would like to include this information on our website, but other community outreach is possible, if the volunteer has a vision about how to incorporate it with Art on Alberta's mission. We are also seeking a historian for the art on the street, and it would be ideal for these to positions to work together at times.

4. Media Assistant



5. Gallery Assistant


