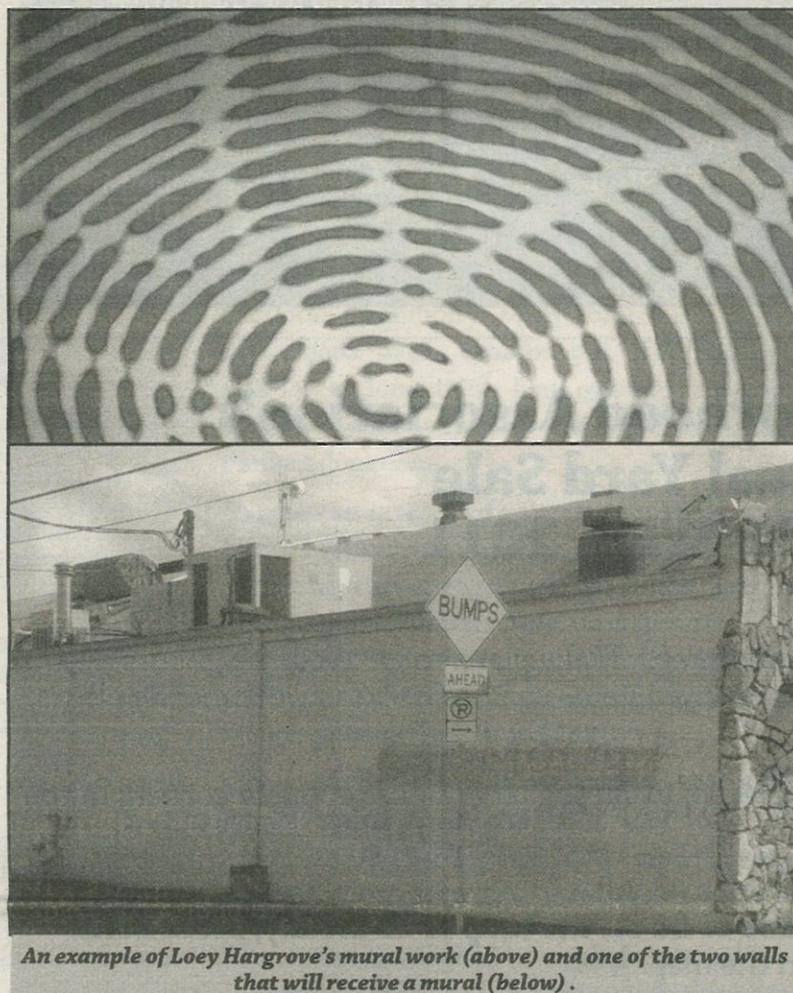
NE 42nd Ave To Get Murals from Local Artist

Public input invited for design process

The Alberta Court Crossing intersection project is gaining momentum. Concerned community members and local business associations have been organizing to improve the 42nd Ave. business district, and have chosen the intersection of NE 42nd Ave. and NE Alberta Court for a mural project. The intersection is a primary thoroughfare for vehicles, bicyclists and bus riders.

Placing murals on the two large walls facing northbound and southbound traffic on 42nd Ave. was determined to have the greatest visual impact given the large size and visibility of two walls. The murals were thus selected to initiate the improvement process. These walls belong to The Spare Room Lounge and Doggy Business dog care; both businesses are enthusiastic participants.

Loey Hargrove is the lead artist for the murals. After moving into the Cully neighborhood three years ago, Loey painted exterior signage and an eye-catching design for Delphina's Bakery. Carolyn Mistell, the owner of Delphina's and former president of the 42nd Ave. Business Association kept Loey informed on matters of the evolution of the 42nd Ave. improvement. When a decision was made unanimously that murals were an ideal starting point, Loey agreed to

be the lead artist.

A design concept was reached by consensus, and Loey has created several potential sketches. This is still an ongoing process, and the community is invited to give input. While this mural

is regarded as a volunteer community project by those involved, there is currently an effort to seek funding to assist with some costs.

Buildings Receive Matching Grants for Façade Improvement

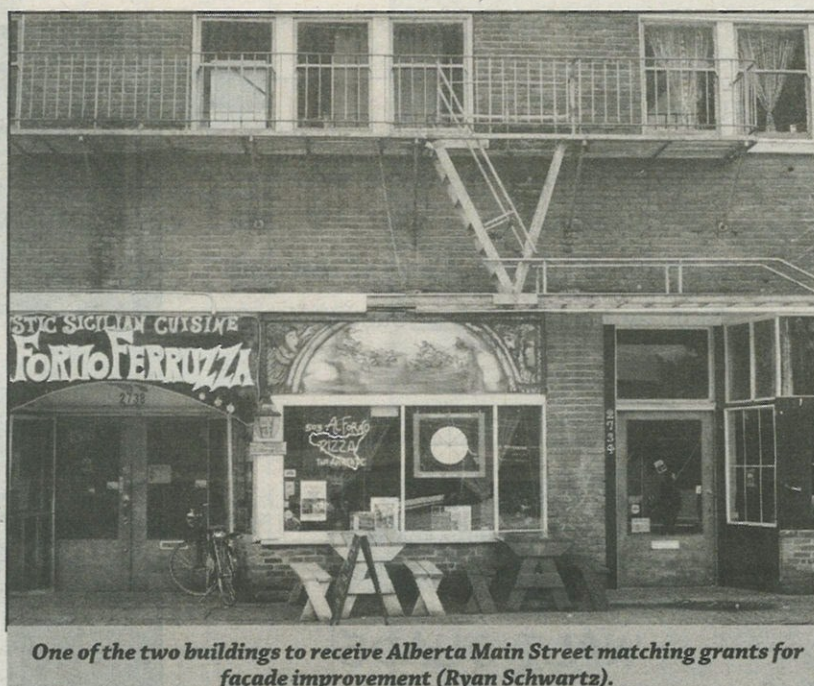

Alberta Main Street has announced participants in the 2011 Green Façade Improvement Program, which provides up to \$5,000 in matching funds and design assistance to businesses to improve the appearance of individual building facades, signs and awnings. To be eligible for the grants, improvements must be made to areas visible from the public way and include a green component.

The goal of this program is to make revitalization efforts affordable, creative and sustainable. Each grant

requires a one to one match from the applicant.

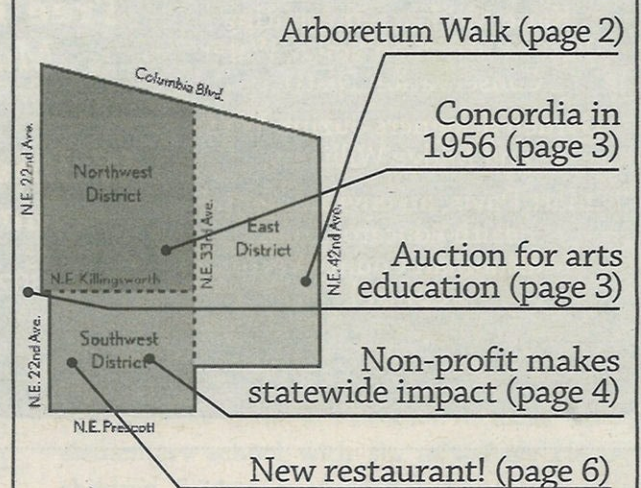

Concordia tree steward and Tree Team member Jim Gersbach will be leading a walking tour of trees in the Ainsworth Linear Arboretum from Fernhill Park to Alberta Park on Thursday evening, May 19 from 6 PM to 7:30 PM.

Meet on the NE 37th Avenue side of Fernhill Park on the south end of the tennis courts (not far from the merry go round). The walk is free and part of the City of Portland's Green Walks series. Gersbach will discuss the natural history of some of the many tree species along the route, including their suitability as street and yard trees in Portland. Tree Inventory Results Are In!

In 2010, a street tree inventory of Concordia was taken by over 50 trained volunteers. Trees at every tax lot in the neighborhood were inventoried; data collected included tree type, condition and size. Concordia's public right-of-ways host a diverse array of tree types. The street tree population consists of 4,636 trees of 82 types. Fifteen tree types comprise nearly 80% of the total, leaving the remaining types to represent 1% or less of the neighborhood's trees.

6 most common trees in the Concordia Neighborhood

- Maple (1068 trees, 23% of total)
- Cherry (434 trees, 9.4% of total)
- Dogwood (349 trees, 7.5% of total)
- Crabapple (298 trees, 6.4% of total)
- Ash (266 trees, 5.7% of total)
- Plum (207 trees, 4.5% of total)

The Great Ainsworth Food Market Fire

There have been food markets in the building on the corner of NE 30th and Ainsworth for a long time, but few have made the news quite like the one that was there in 1956.

The current building houses a mini-market and the Concordia Campus bookstore. The original market was a brick building that covered the same area. In 1956, when I was 20 years

old, a fire of unknown origin started after normal store hours and engulfed the entire structure. In response to an alarm sent by a neighbor from the fire alarm box on the corner, a large number of firemen fought the blazing inferno into the night.

Fire alarms in those days weren't reported by telephone, they were sent by breaking a small pane of glass on

the front of one of the alarm boxes sprinkled strategically throughout the city and pulling down on the little lever covered by the glass. The boxes were about nine or ten inches wide, about a

foot tall, with a peaked roof and typically attached to a telephone pole.

The fire was finally extinguished, but it left the building a total loss with nothing but the exterior brick walls standing and

the rest a pile of smoldering ashes. As one can imagine, there were a lot of neighborhood people who witnessed the fire, all standing safe distances away while they watched the firemen in action.

The property was cleared and the current building was constructed not long after the fire. Now it once again houses a mini-market.

From Concordia, Black United Fund of Oregon creates opportunity for low-income communities

Nestled between two commercial stretches of Alberta Street, the Black United Fund of Oregon's building is subtle compared to the impact their work has across the state. "We're your community resource," said Executive Director Adrienne Livingston. "Don't judge this book by the cover that is one block of a peach building."

Since 1983, the Black United Fund of Oregon has provided grants, scholarships and educational workshops to advance opportunities for the state's

low-income communities of all races. They focus on six different areas of advancement: arts, education, economic development, health, human services and social justice.

Individuals can apply for scholarships and attend a number of educational events, including an annual scholarship workshop. The Black United Fund of Oregon partners with a handful of colleges to provide educational opportunities for low-income students.

Non-profits and community organizations can apply for grants to enhance their community impact. Organizations working in Concordia that are partially funded by the Black United Fund include Sisters of the Road, Chess for Success, Growing Gardens and the African American Outdoor Association.

Livingston grew up in Northeast Portland and has seen changes in the community that make her determined to increase the amount of small businesses and non-profits on Alberta Street. "Rising prices challenge small non-profits and businesses wanting to move on to Alberta Street. Individuals who want to live in this community and participate in this community are being priced out of this community," said Livingston.

Gardens by Suzinn Weiss

I write this in late April, my thermometer reads 47 degrees with an expected low of 38 during the night so I can't really recommend planting delicate annual vegetable starts and certainly not tomatoes no matter how many fabulous varieties are tempting you at the nurseries. Well, OK, buy them if you must but unless you have a green house or cold frame DO NOT plant them in the ground.

If they are in 4" pots, replant them in 1-gallon pots and put them on a sunny windowsill or if the day is warm let them enjoy time outdoors but you'll have better results later if you keep the plants inside during cool weather. I had one gardener tell me she was going to tuck her tomato plants into bed at night! I usually wait until June to plant mine in the ground.

If we end up having a cool, short summer you'll get a better tomato harvest with smaller varieties. Try growing tomatillos, which are great for fresh salsa, cooking and pickling. Mine went nonstop from August to frost.

While waiting for warmer days, take a free class at the East Multnomah Soil and Water Conservation district, 5211 N. Williams Avenue. It's worth a visit to the office to see their beautiful demonstration garden and the inventive, artful downspout on the North side of the building.

New research shows our copper pipes, gutters, downspouts and rain chains are harmful to salmon. Copper contributes to the fish losing their olfactory function, which plays a key role in species recognition, migration, reproduction and predator avoidance.

If you're thinking of having a big tree, shrub or hedge removed this season please wait until after nesting season (4/1-7/30). Birds have enough obstacles hindering successful nesting without having their homes literally being ripped out from under them!

Finally, I hope you'll take the time to just be in your garden and take a few swipes at the weeds as you enjoy the beauty surrounding you!

Enzo's: Italian Comfort Food

Stop by Enzo's in the middle of the afternoon, and you'll be greeted by Enzo Lanzadoro and his sister Carmela as they prepare fresh pasta and other regional delights from their former home in southern Italy. In a joyous, uplifting atmosphere, they offer diners food from the heart — simple and satisfying Italian comfort food.

Last month, Enzo opened his new restaurant on Alberta St. after outgrowing a small cafe in the Southwest hills. In their cozy kitchen, Enzo and his family make homemade bread, pasta, sausage, mozzarella and classic desserts such as cannoli and tiramisu from family recipes that have been handed down for generations. Enzo's recipe for Quasanella sausage was created over 150 years ago when it was chosen above all others for an offering to the patron saint of Torritto, a small village on the Southeast coast of Italy.

Enzo's opens at 11AM Tuesday through Saturday, offering fresh baked bread and Italian espresso. For the lunch crowd, Enzo's serves authentic thin-crust pizzas and paninis. Both their pasta and pizza are nearly gluten-free, and they are trying to perfect recipes for both that contain no gluten. The restaurant also serves Italian wines along with light and dark brews of beer from Menebrea, an Italian brewer.

"We've received a warm welcome and love this area; already we have repeat customers," says Enzo. "Our idea is to get involved in the neighborhood but it will take time to expand."

The chefs' skills extend beyond the kitchen. Enzo created the ceramic tiles that decorate the dining room, and Carmela made the paintings. With his daughter as a hostess, Enzo has created a truly family-run restaurant bringing Concordia an unfiltered taste of delicious Italian cuisine.

How can we experience your art?

I open my studio by appointment and people can make what they want to make and fire it and shape it in the kiln. You don't need experience to come; you can be a four year old. I have pre-cut pieces that you can re-arrange and I do all the technical parts. Its having fun and playing with glass. You can make ornaments, rings, necklaces, magnets, decorative pieces, plates and serving platters. There are glass mushrooms in front of my house that people might see when they take a walk.

What is your favorite neighborhood hang-out?

I like taking a walk to the Concordia University Library and going to a little cafe there. I like checking the neighborhood along the walk, checking how the construction is going. My daughter gets books at the library.

Do you have a favorite story about your neighborhood?

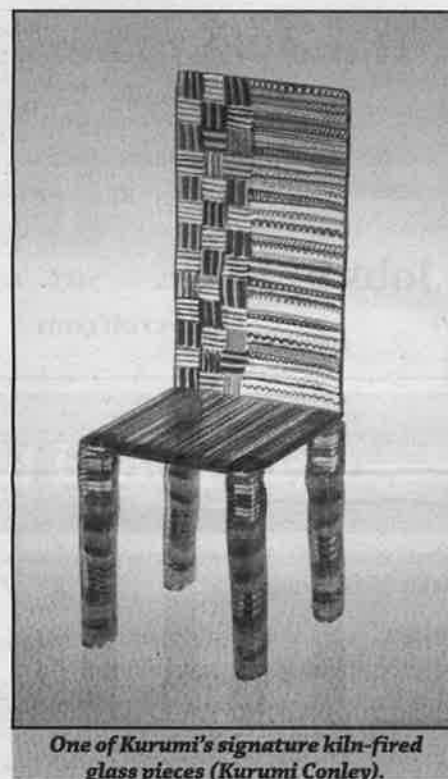
There was a cat in my neighborhood that went around to all the houses. Everyone had their own names for him, but his name was C-A-T. Recently he passed away. All of my neighbors got together and we had a memorial service for the cat. Our kids went and picked flowers and we all shared food and stories about him.

Where can we find your art?

Some of my artwork is in the Guardino gallery at NE 30th & Alberta. Lemontree gift store on NE 40th in the Hollywood District also has it. I make some sculptural pieces; a glass chair is one of my signature pieces.

I want to add that I am Japanese and I am coordinating personal disaster relief shipments to a fellow glass artist in Sendai. These shipments consist of messages of hope and encouragement and small glass art paperweights to give cheer to children in the stricken area. 
